

"Every time Mardi Gras comes around, I find myself talking on three cell phones all at the same time," said Tessier MacKenzie. "I'm keeping Verizon in business these days."

Tessier Mackenzie credits the original Woonsocket Mardi Gras celebration to Woonsocket Jaycees who in 1954, decided the city needed something to break up the winter doldrums. Then, as now, there was a contest for a queen as well as a mysterious King Jayce, which was named for the Jaycees. For five days, various events were held throughout the city, drawing thousands of spectators. By 1961, the celebration ended. Ten years ago, the Northern Rhode Island Council of the Arts rejuvenated the celebration and it has grown each year since, said the chairperson.

The theme for this year's coronation is "Mardi Gras Roundup" and planners will be making an appearance at the event dressed in western style clothing. Guests are encouraged to attend in similar style with an award to be presented for best male and female costumes.

The Elks Lodge site will see the unmasking of King Jayce at 9:30 p.m. For weeks now, a number of clues have been released to see who can correctly name his honor prior to the unmasking. One winner to be drawn from those who have guessed correctly will be pre sented with a \$500 booklet of Massachusetts lottery tickets.

As it has for the past nine years, the celebration begins with the official naming of a queen and court that is set to take place this Sunday, Feb. 1, from 1-3 p.m. at the Elks Lodge on Social Street. Since last November, six contestants have
